

The President's Corner-David A. Smith, UC-Irvine

It's October! Back where I grew up in upstate New York, this time of the year was associated with morning chill, frost on pumpkins, increasingly early sunsets, and the burst of color of fall foliage. Here in southern California things are a bit different: last week in Irvine it was 105 degrees F: the hottest day of the entire calendar year (and, honestly, despite the scientific reality of "global warming," September heat waves in this part of the world are actually sort of "normal"!). While the summer break is now over here (and LA's new pro football team has ended their "training camp" on our athletic fields) – in the last two or three weeks students arrived back on our campus *en-masse* – it's not quite time, yet, to put away the shorts or sandals since our "change of season" is a bit different.

It's also the final weeks of an increasingly tense and I think it's fair to say quite unusual Presidential election campaign. The nominees are two of the most unfavorably viewed candidates ever to run for that office, each is openly despised by supporters of the other, and there's a great deal of polarization between partisans in the country. A recent *Los Angeles Times* story pointed out that, while Donald Trump's chances of winning California's electoral votes are negligible, in many inland and rural areas of the state there are actually millions of Californians who will cast their ballots for him (in sheer numbers far more here than in most of the die hard "red states").

Many people I know are quite engaged in this election. Some want to see the first woman elected President; many others are worried about the prospect of a boorish "billionaire" who seems to have racist, misogynist and xenophobic views (not to mention a rather loose grasp of basic political and economic realities in contemporary society) win the Oval Office. A lot of people in that latter group are incredulous: how could people consider voting for someone like that? what are our fellow citizens thinking? Of course, the media are mostly interested in the "horse race" aspect to all of this, the latest outrageous comments or tweets from the campaigns (okay, most of those come from one of them!), and the latest "breaking news" about some scandal or indiscretion associated with the Clintons or the Trumps. The "coverage" tends to be rather free of discussions of complications like actual policy differences between the candidates, much less analysis of how and why our country finds itself in the throes of this unique electoral season.

In my final column as CSA President, I want to suggest that this might be yet another case where the power of a globally attuned sociological framework can be of great value. If we look at the rise of Mr. Trump, the recent "Brexit" vote in the United Kingdom, and various other "nationalist/populist" movements in some of the other relatively wealthy countries in the world, I believe there may be some commonalities. It turns out that there has been a massive restructuring of the world-economy in the past three or four decades that led to the "deindustrialization" of huge swathes of the United States, the "outsourcing" of many formally middle income earning manufacturing (and now, increasingly, service) jobs, the burgeoning inequality in our country, and a growing demand for very low-wage workers, including but not limited to immigrants from our poorer neighboring countries from the South (and, again, this is NOT unique to the US: it is clearly impacting Europe and particularly Great Britain as well).

For many "ordinary" working people this seems to have created a "crisis of legitimacy" in our political system. The awareness of vast inequalities and a sense its unfairness is widely shared (in the US it spans the political spectrum from "Occupy movement" on the left, to the "Tea Party" activists on the right); this leads to deep and pervasive anger against the "establishment." The traditional working classes and even middle income people are experiencing downward mobility (or, at least, a "fear of falling") and great economic uncertainty (parents are particularly worried about their children's future prospects), while elite incomes and wealth seem to skyrocket and the political power seems to rest squarely in the hands of an increasingly disconnected plutocracy of the 1 percent (or, more accurately, the .1 or .01 percent). This is a recipe for political dynamite! And both the UK's Brexit voters and the US supporters of Donald Trump seem to be drawn from the ranks of the very angry and (at least temporarily) mobilized ranks of the "hollowed out" former native middle classes.

Just to be clear: it is not at all obvious to me what Mr. Trump offers as a "solution" to his disaffected followers (the same might be said of the Brexit decision in the UK). Indeed, the xenophobia, nativism and racism that appear to be intrinsically linked to this brand of "populist" demagoguery should distress all of us who support an inclusive and prosperous multi-cultural society (which we can proudly say our own state epitomizes). In fact, there is some evidence that the rhetoric of the Trump campaign has emboldened followers to also express openly bigoted and chauvinistic views (not good!). But I do believe a "structural approach" that emphasizes a close look at impact that major shifts in the global-economy has had on the US population can help us "explain" what is going on. People are not

"crazy" or irrational in their rejection of "politics as usual"... they actually have good reason to question the *status quo* and are legitimately worried about their families' futures. (Continued on page 2.)

Our job as sociologists and intellectuals should be to expose the actually causes of the economic gap and the political polarization and offer some real-life solutions. We urgently need to get to work on that!

Speaking of elections: be sure to cast your vote for an excellent slate of candidates for statewide CSA offices! And I look forward to seeing everyone in Riverside for the annual meeting at the Mission Inn. It will be three of four days before the election, so I suspect there will be lots to discuss!

One last more mundane note (since this is my final column as CSA President): The 2016 CSA conference at the Mission Inn in Riverside is not my direct responsibility. But I saw a preliminary program that came out in June (and, indeed, I know that the proposed list of invited and open sessions is growing in the past month!). It will be characterized, as always by sessions on a range of topics, panels designed for undergraduate and graduate students as well as faculty, and no doubt another excellent buffet and keynote speaker/awards dinner. For most of us in southern California, the location is relatively short drive - and, for anyone who hasn't visited the hotel itself is very unique and interesting. I am encouraging my UC-Irvine colleagues and students to participate and I am confident many will: you should plan to be there, too!

I am proud to be able to serve as lead organizer for this year's conference. You can see the schedule elsewhere in this newsletter. I'm excited about the broad diversity of sessions, covering most of the major areas of sociological inquiry. There are many excellent sessions, and we do have a full schedule. A big thank you goes to the session organizers for finding and receiving presenters for each session. Most sessions have 3-4 papers, but a few had as many as 5 or even 6 presenters. Each organizer will run the session based on their own preference regarding the time left for discussion, and when such discussion occurs (e.g., after each presenter or at the end). Most organizers reserve discussion for the end, after each person is given an equal amount of time to present. If discussion is allowed after each presenter rather than at the end, then the organizer will need to have strict time limits on the discussion to ensure the remaining presenters have equal time to present. Each room will have a projector and screen. Organizers will need to work with presenters regarding the use of laptops, power-point files, and connections between the laptop and the projector. The projectors will have standard vga inputs. If your laptops do not have a vga output, please bring an adapter. You can see the standard adapters available by doing an internet search for "vga adapter". We will have some adapters, but we cannot promise there will be an adapter that covers all existing laptop connections. There will not be audio connections in the room, so if you need to show anything with audio, you will need to bring your own speaker (or make sure your laptop is loud enough). For all paying members (i.e., not including student observers) we welcome you to join us Friday evening for the keynote address and buffet dinner. The address will be given by esteemed sociologist Dr. Mark Juergensmeyer, who is author of many articles and books on issues of religion, activism, and terrorism. One of my favorite sociological books of all time is his book Terror in the Mind of God, which still stands the test of time as an excellent example of international comparative cultural analysis, and an insightful study of religious terrorism. In his address and the plenary session directly before it, Dr. Juergensmeyer will guide us in thinking about terrorism and other current topics we face in this election year. As I stated earlier there are many excellent sessions at this year's conference, and I strongly encourage you to attend as many of them as possible to support your colleagues and build your own understanding of emerging research in the great field of sociology. Also, please take some time to explore your surroundings at the Mission Inn, which is one of the top hotels in the country. In closing, I want to thank our past presidents, David Smith and Anne Marenco, as well as the Executive Director, Ed Nelson, and all the other members of the California Sociological Association Board of Directors, for their help and guidance in organizing this conference. I look forward to a lively conference. See you in Riverside!

Instructional Exercises Using SPSS, PSPP, and SDA

Ed Nelson has been developing a series of instructional exercises that can be used to introduce students to quantitative analysis. They utilize data from various sources and three different statistical packages – SPSS, PSPP, and SDA (Survey Documentation and Analysis – an online statistical package) to analyze the data. This is an ongoing project, but at the moment there are seven sets of exercises:

- exercises for an introductory course in statistics using SPSS, PSPP, and SDA
- exercises focusing on religion and including concepts such as religious preference, religiosity, and fundamentalism,
- exercises on tolerance that are based on questions from Samuel Stouffer's classic book, Communism, Conformity, and Civil Liberties
- exercises focusing on attitudes toward abortion using the seven abortion questions from the General Social Survey,
- exercises on confidence in societal institutions and spending priorities
- exercises on gender difference
- exercises on critical thinking, and
- exercises on gun control using SDA
- In the next few months we will be adding three more sets:
- exercises for an introductory course in statistics using SDA,
- exercises for a research methods course using SDA, and
- exercises on gun control using SDA.
